

The Old Debtors' Prison

From at least 1675 until final closure in 1855 Devon County Debtors' Prison occupied this site. Now only the archway entrance remains as part of a car salesroom. In Victorian times, debtors were of two categories: those who had people who could pay for their lodging, and those who were destitute: the paupers. There was neither doctor nor chaplain.

The Old Pumping Station

This ornate Victorian building was constructed in 1867 to house the steam pumping engine for water from a well, dug here, to supply St Thomas with its own supply. The water was pumped up to a covered reservoir, still in use, on the west side of Dunsford Road. The site is now in use as a car-wash.

The Old Workhouse

St Thomas Union Workhouse was constructed in 1836 at a cost of £11,000. Built in the 'Hanoverian' style it housed 430 paupers. Behind the grand facade, the Y-shaped buildings, in three wings, accommodated the destitute poor. In addition to the original chapel, the Victorians later added an infirmary. In 1948 this building became the NHS Redhills Hospital, which closed in 1990. It has now been converted to residential use.

Exeter Asylum

The foundation stone for what was known as the City of Exeter Lunatic Asylum was laid by Rev James Manning in 1803. This new building of three walled courts and three gardens, along with five indoor galleries, provided accommodation for seventy patients. Unusually for its time, its constitution stated that inmates were there to be cured of their conditions rather than being considered hopeless cases. The hospital closed in 1869, and Bowhill Primary School now stands on the site.


2 Corinthians 1:3-4

Historic Sites Directions

- 1 Begin in Cowick Street at the precinct traffic lights junction. The Old Debtors' Prison archway is on the corner, next to Hospicecare.
- 2 Walk along Buller Road with the Lucombe Oak pub on your right. Pass Clinton Street and Cleveland Street on your right and Nelson Road on your left. At the 5-road junction is the Old Pumping Station.
- 3 Continue walking along Buller Road until it meets Okehampton Road. The former Emmanuel Church is opposite. Turn left here. Cross Okehampton Road at the pedestrian crossing and carry on walking (gently uphill) on the right-hand pavement. Pass the general store and Post Office and the end of Wardrew Road on your left. Fork right up a small road, blocked off for traffic. This leads directly to the front of the Old Workhouse.
4. Return to the small road and turn right. In a few yards you will meet Exwick Road. Turn left and go straight across the crossroads onto Buddle Lane. Follow Buddle Lane, passing the Green gables Inn on your left. Turn right and Bowhill Primary School will be in front of you. The historic site of the Exeter Asylum is under the playground, but there are some signs it was once there if you look carefully.
5. To return to this walk's starting point, walk back to Buddle Lane and turn left onto Cowick Street. Walk along Cowick Street until you see St Thomas Church on your right.
