Who We Are

Based in the London Borough of Brent, The Asian Women's Resource Centre (AWRC) is a specialist women's organisation offering independent by and for needs led support services to Black, Minority and Ethnic (BME) women and girls experiencing abuse across London.

AWRC's mission of tackling violence against women and girls and challenging systemic discrimination and patriarchal violence is propelled by our commitment to intersectional feminism and values deeply rooted in empowering and safeguarding BME women.

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OUR LEGACY

Asian Women's Resource Centre (AWRC) and ASRAA, a refuge project began in the 1970s with the help of urban and social services grant aid funds. Like other sister organisations, AWRC was set up by a group of Asian women to address issues of domestic violence and needs of survivors that mainstream organisations were failing to meet at the time. These needs reflected the inequalities that women of colour faced stemming from racism, inadequate welfare provisions and lack of cultural understanding within mainstream organisations, language support and awareness of domestic abuse.

In 1980, the Centre became independent from the refuge and came to be known as the Asian Women's Resource Centre in its own right. Today, AWRC is a strong team of 30 women and based at 108 Craven Park, Harlesden.

OVER 40 YEARS OF SUPPORTING WOMEN

AWRC is one of the leading organisations providing support services to Black, Minority, Ethnic (BME) women and girls across London experiencing domestic abuse and harmful practices. We offer a range of by and for needs led services in 24 languages, supporting every aspect of women's needs and providing a wrap around holistic approach to support. Our organisation also has partner projects with other organisations within the 'ending VAWG' sector.

For more than 40 years, AWRC, as a feminist organisation, has upheld values of inclusivity, autonomy and justice. It continues to work for human rights, anti-discrimination and liberation from oppression.

CONVERSATIONS WITH INSPIRATIONAL WOMEN SPEAKER SERIES



“BUILDING RESILIENCE”

Forty women have attended our ‘Conversations with Inspirational Women’ Speaker Series, launched in partnership with **The Company of Entrepreneurs** in October 2023.



Instigated by AWRC Trustee and Patron and Court Assistant of The Company of Entrepreneurs, Rita Bologna, the aim of the Series is to provide a direct link between successful businesswomen and women supported by AWRC, through which they can share stories and experiences, motivate, learn from and inspire each other. Emphasising the themes of “Building Resilience”, “Leadership” and “Anything is Possible”, guest speakers Rita Bologna, Veronica Heaven and Jenny Garrett spoke about their journeys, the obstacles they faced along the way and the strategies used to overcome these, which included a combination of hard work, determination and focus. In thought-provoking and often moving interviews, the 3 women used personal and professional anecdotes which resonated strongly with their audience:

PARTNERSHIP PROJECTS LED BY AWRC

Greater London Authority (GLA) Safe Accommodation Housing Project : The project provides a Pan-London NRPF Helpline, acting as a single point of entry into specialist refuge provision and floating support services to improve access to safe accommodation to survivors with NRPF.

ASCENT Ending Harmful Practices : The project aims to improve service provision for those affected by sexual and domestic abuse, specifically Female Genital Mutilation, 'so called' honour-based abuse, forced marriage and other harmful practices.

MOPAC Prevention and Action Through Community Engagement and Training (P&ACT) Ending Harmful Practices Project: This is a partnership project with 12 other by and for led organisations addressing harmful practices across London. Funded by the Mayor's Office for Policing and Crime (MOPAC), AWRC provides vital support to survivors and in combatting harmful practices. This is the largest by and for led partnership in the UK addressing harmful practices.

PARTNERSHIP PROJECTS

London Whole Housing Service Partnership (LWHSP): LWHSP works to address and enhance the pathways of housing support for women experiencing domestic abuse. The partnership works to remove immediate harm, provide safe, sustainable and borough- specific support around housing needs and aid recovery and resettlement of women.

The London Holistic Advocacy Wrap Around Service (LHAWAS): The project aims to meet the needs of women and children who are survivors of domestic and sexual abuse and other forms of gendered abuse, including prostitution, trafficking, and harmful practices, who have insecure immigration status and are subject to no recourse to public funds (NRPF).

Identification and Referral to Improve Safety (IRIS): IRIS is a training, support and referral programme for GP practices delivered by Advance, in partnership with AWRC. The project aims to equip health professionals with an improved understanding of domestic abuse and its relevance to health, a better knowledge of how to respond and ask questions appropriately about domestic abuse, how to contact and refer to a domestic abuse specialist and the importance of safeguarding in regard to domestic abuse.

Coaction Hub: The project is a 3-year partnership between AWRC and Standing Together Against Domestic Abuse (STADA). It aims to strengthen the Co-ordinated Community Response (CCR) to improve responses to BME survivors of domestic abuse and harmful practices. The project aims to create an equitable partnership between a by and for BME led organisation with a second-tier white led organisation, with each agency bringing their expertise to the project.

The Harmful Practice Independent Domestic Abuse Advocate Programme: The Harmful Practice IDVA Programme, funded by Esmée Fairbairn Foundation, is a pioneering initiative developed by the Asian Women's Resource Centre (AWRC), which stands at the forefront of addressing harmful practices within the complex landscape of Violence Against BME Women and Girls (VAWG). Rooted in Black Feminist perspective and intersectional approach, the program is crafted to equip practitioners with specialised knowledge and skills and strives to carve a unique specialist role for Harmful Practice Advocates within the Black and Minority services working in the 'ending VAWG' sector.

Surviving Abuse and Thriving Project (SAAT): In addition to providing intensive advocacy and support to women and girls experiencing or previously affected by domestic abuse, the project supports women by assessing their needs, creating safe spaces for socialising and seeking advice and providing volunteering opportunities.
