This year, 860 children across Tendring will receive presents—children who might otherwise have gone without. That's the kind of Christmas magic we can all believe in!

A special shout-out goes to Oscar Gillmore, a remarkable 10-year-old who raised over £3,000 for the appeal by running and cycling 200km in October. I had the pleasure (and the challenge!) of joining Oscar for nearly 5km—though, truth be told, he left me in the dust. Oscar, you've certainly earned a rest (and maybe an extra mince pie) this Christmas!

On the policing front, our focus on preventing and solving crime remains as strong as ever. Despite what some may say, crime is down in Tendring, and we're determined to keep it that way into 2026 and beyond.

## Operation Sceptre: Working together to tackle knife crime in Tendring

The Neighbourhood Policing Team (NPT) partnered with Tendring District Council and the charity Save a Life, Ditch a Knife as part of Operation Sceptre, a national initiative focused on reducing knife crime and raising awareness of its devastating impact on communities.

The operation included:

- Knife sweeps in public spaces to remove dangerous weapons from our streets
- Responsible retailer visits to ensure compliance with laws on selling knives and bladed articles
- Community engagement to educate and encourage safer choices

The involvement of Save a Life, Ditch a Knife helped us share the message that carrying a knife is never the answer. Together, we're working to make Clacton and surrounding areas safer for everyone.





## CVST's Victorian Christmas market brings festive cheer to Clacton

## Empowering young people with The Respect Project in the Lake District

PCSO Michele Diss recently returned from an inspiring week in the Lake District with Essex Boys and Girls Club and students from three Tending schools as part of The Respect Project.

Taking part as a PCSO helped break down barriers between police and young people while supporting them through incredible challenges – from climbing a mountain and camping overnight in -3°C to learning survival skills and taking responsibility for cooking and cleaning.

The Respect Project aims to build stronger communities by supporting Year 9 students across Essex who need extra help to stay engaged in education. Through life skills sessions and outdoor challenges, more than 5,000 young people have grown in confidence, resilience, and teamwork. These experiences create lasting positive changes for individuals, families, and communities.





## Marine Unit joins forces with Kent and Essex IFCA for training on the River Colne

On Tuesday 25 November, the Marine Unit carried out training exercises on the River Colne at Brightlingsea alongside colleagues from the Kent and Essex Inshore Fisheries and Conservation Authority (IFCA).

The Marine Unit works closely throughout the year with Kent and Essex IFCA, conducting joint patrols and operations, sharing information and intelligence, and delivering joint training to protect our waterways and marine environment.

## Dog owner accepts strict conditions after livestock attack in Alresford

A woman whose dog attacked livestock near Alresford has agreed to strict conditions for future dog ownership.

Our Rural Engagement Team investigated reports of a dog worrying sheep in a field on 8 November. Sadly, one sheep died, another had to be put down, and a third was treated for injuries.

The 20-year-old Colchester woman admitted the offence and received an adult conditional caution.

Investigating officer PC Dane Wyatt explained that a conditional caution is not an easy option, “We spoke with the livestock owner and agreed a course of action to promote responsible dog ownership in the future. Victims are often concerned to ensure that such attacks are not repeated, and the dog owner learns from the incident.”





## Stay alert: Vehicle theft prevention in Tendring

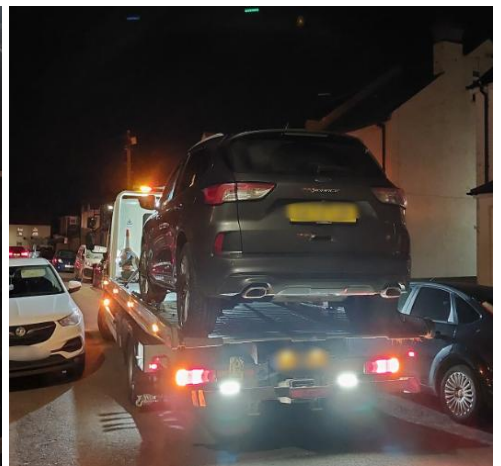
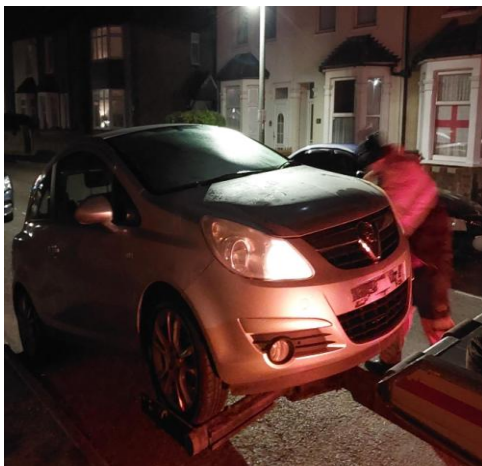
Following the recovery of several stolen vehicles in Clacton by officers on proactive patrols, we're reminding all residents to remain vigilant. Your awareness is key to reducing vehicle theft across the Tendring district, please report anything unusual.

To help protect your vehicle, whether it's the family car, your motorbike, or a business van, consider these crime prevention tips:

- Always lock and secure your vehicle, even for short stops.
- Remove valuables from view and keep keys away from doors and windows at home.
- Use extra security measures such as steering wheel locks or tracking devices.
- Park in well-lit areas or secure garages whenever possible.
- Report suspicious behaviour immediately.

If you suspect someone is involved in car theft, know where a stolen vehicle may be, or notice anything unusual, contact Essex Police on 101, or 999 in an emergency.

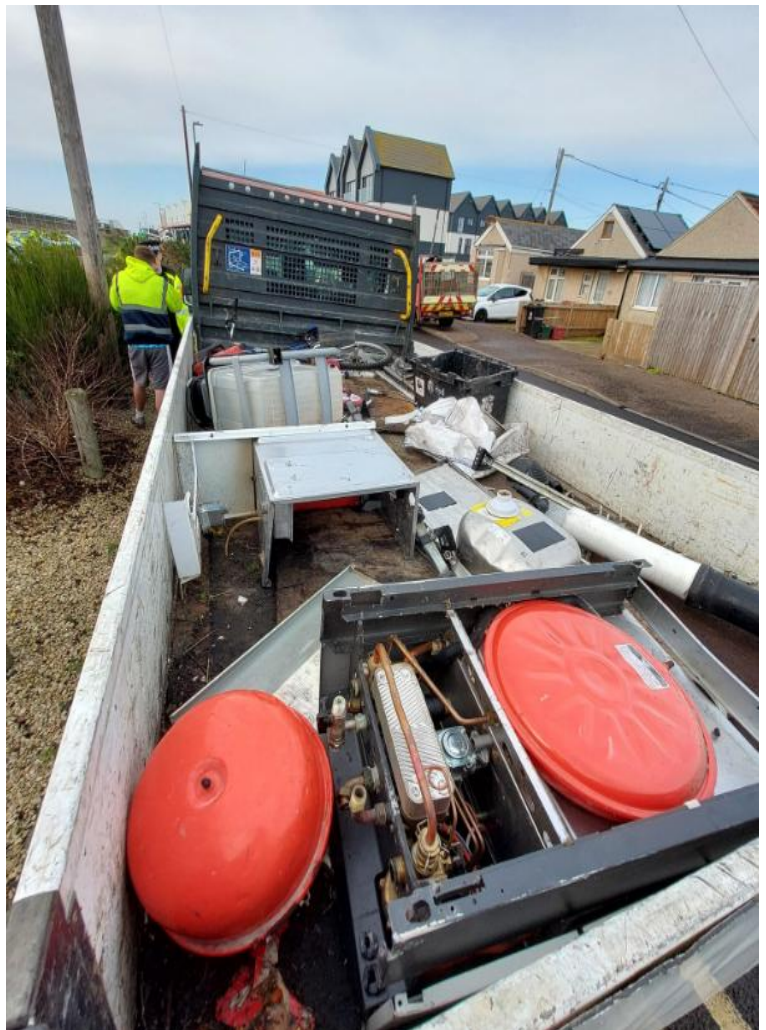
## Traffic operation in Jaywick targets driving offences and road safety

On Friday 28 November, the Neighbourhood Policing Team carried out a traffic operation in Jaywick, focusing on offences such as no insurance, driving without a licence (DWOL), and minor vehicle defects.

In just three hours at a static stop, the team achieved the following results:

- 1 vehicle seized after the driver was found to have an expired licence
- 10 Traffic Offence Reports issued for offences including DWOL, no insurance, no seatbelt, and insecure loads
- 1 male stop-searched under Section 23 and found in possession of Class B drugs, which was dealt with accordingly

We'll be taking this operation to other areas of the Tendring district each month, so stay tuned for updates!

## Vehicle crime operation in Frinton and Walton targets road safety

On Monday 1 December, officers from the Tendring Neighbourhood Policing Team carried out a vehicle crime operation in Frinton and Walton, focusing on road safety and driver behaviour.

In just four hours, the team stopped 69 vehicles, resulting in:

- Seatbelt offences – 3
- Mobile phone offences – 6
- Driving otherwise than in accordance with a licence (DOWL) – 3
- No MOT – 2
- No insurance – 3
- Reported to DVLA for poor eyesight – 1
- Vehicles seized – 3

Operations like this are vital to improving road safety, reducing risk, and keeping our communities safe.

Oscar, you've shown what true community spirit looks like—thank you for making such a difference!



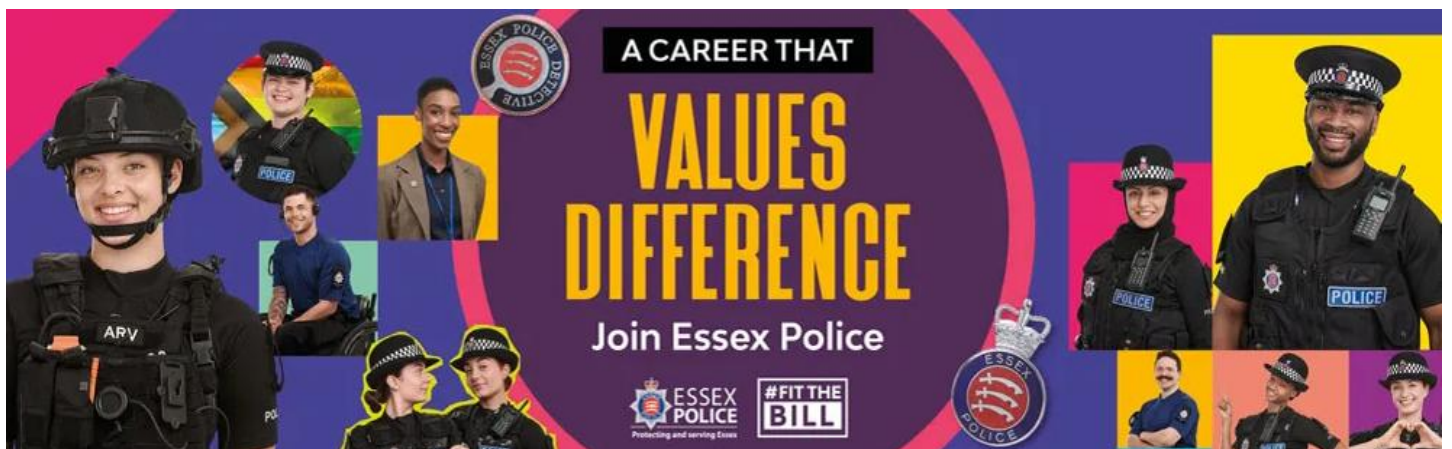


## Community connections in Jaywick

## Vehicle crime operation in Manningtree and Lawford targeting road safety

Tuesday 2 December, the Tendring Neighbourhood Policing Team carried out a five-hour traffic operation across three sites: Long Road Lawford, A137 Manningtree, and Manningtree Walls/Station Road/Harwich Road.

Combined results from the deployment:

- Driving otherwise than in accordance with a licence (DOWL) – 1
- Seatbelt offences – 10
- No MOT – 2
- Mobile phone offences – 8
- No insurance – 4
- Due care and attention – 1
- Disqualified driver reported to court – 1
- Vehicles seized – 5
- Arrest – 1 (drug driving)
- Words of advice regarding speeding – 10
- Speeding ticket issued – 1

Total vehicles stopped: 241

Operations like this are vital for improving road safety, tackling uninsured and unsafe driving, and keeping our communities safe.

Thank you to the many drivers who adhered to the law and helped make this operation run smoothly. Your cooperation is greatly appreciated!





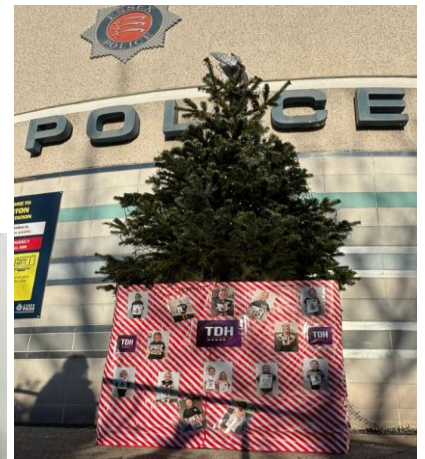
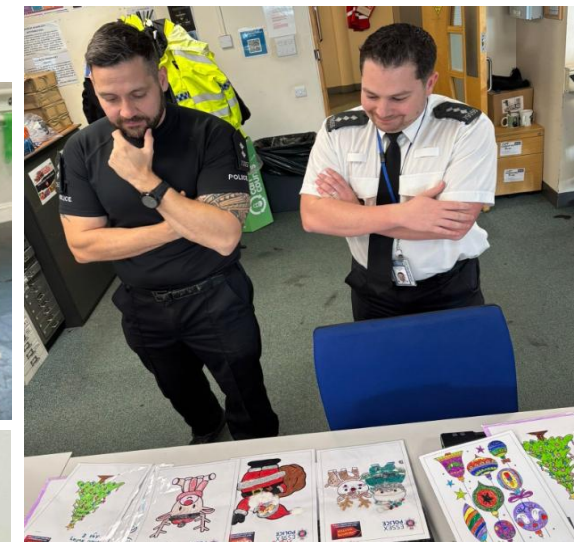
## Festive creativity at Clacton Police Station

## Harwich: Shoplifter admits 21 shop thefts after neighbourhood policing team investigation

A Harwich shoplifter has admitted a series of shop thefts in the town after he was arrested by Tendring neighbourhood policing officers last week.

Perry Stearn, 33, of All Saints Close, had just stolen £115 of popular children's toys from the B& M and Home Bargains stores in Parkeston when officers caught up with him in Williamsburg Avenue on 4 December, thanks to a call from a member of the public.



He was already wanted for a series of shop thefts dating back to 29 July 2025.

Following a swift but thorough investigation, Stearn was charged with 21 counts of shop theft involving more than £1,331.61 of meat, chocolate, washing liquid and toys, plus a selection of Advent calendars.

Thanks to CCTV footage and witness statements provided by the stores, Stearn pleaded guilty to all charges when he appeared before Chelmsford magistrates the following day.

He's been remanded on conditional bail not to enter Argos, Asda, B&M Bargains, the Co-op, Home Bargains and Tesco shops in Harwich, until his next court appearance, due at Colchester Magistrates' Court on 7 January 2026.

After the hearing, PC Cooper, of Harwich Neighbourhood Policing Team, said:

"Shop theft is completely unacceptable. It doesn't just affect businesses, it impacts the whole community.

"Local shops work hard to serve residents and theft drives up costs for everyone, damages livelihoods and can even lead to reduced services.

"Our role is to protect our neighbourhoods and support those who are doing the right thing. We will continue to take firm action against offenders and work with partners to keep Harwich a safe and thriving place for all."

And Sgt Bowers urges anyone considering shoplifting this Christmas to think again.

"If you're struggling and thinking about stealing, please remember help is out there.

"Stealing isn't the answer and will only make things worse for you.

"Reach out for support before making a choice that could harm your future."

Food banks, community fridges & pantries and organisations such as the Salvation Army, FoodCycle and local churches can provide food and, in some cases, free meals.

If you're on a low income or are in receipt to benefits, you may be able to apply to the Household Support and Essential Living funds administered by local councils. Citizens Advice can also help you to access benefits, grants and emergency support.

## You Said, We Did – Tendring District Update

We're committed to listening to your concerns and taking action to make our communities safer and stronger. Here's how we've responded to the issues raised across our towns and rural villages.

**You Said:** You told us you were concerned about vehicle crime and unsafe driving in certain areas of the Tendring community.

**We Did:** In response, we carried out two dedicated operations on 1 and 2 December. Across Frinton, Walton, Lawford, and Manningtree, officers stopped more than **300 vehicles**, addressing offences such as mobile phone use, no insurance, disqualified drivers, and drug driving. Several vehicles were seized, and proactive enforcement will continue to keep our roads safe.

## Our monthly infographic offers a glimpse into the activities of Tendring officers over the past month.

### November 2025 Highlights:

- ♦ Located 74 missing persons and provided them with necessary support.
- ♦ Investigated 80 reports of antisocial behaviour, addressing community concerns.
- ♦ Responded to 36 road traffic collisions, ensuring safety and smooth traffic flow.
- ♦ Handled 345 domestic violence-related crimes, addressing the criminal behaviour involved while providing victims with support and connecting them to specialist services.
- ♦ Solved 126 crimes, holding offenders accountable.
- ♦ Submitted 584 intelligence reports to target criminal activities.
- ♦ Conducted 52 stop-and-search operations in the Tendring District to prevent harm.





## Road Crime and Safer Essex Roads Partnership

November was a busy month for road safety across Essex, with enforcement and education efforts continuing to make a real impact. The latest figures from the Safer Essex Roads Partnership and Essex Police highlight both the challenges and the progress being made to keep our roads safe.

### Lives Lost and Serious Injuries

Tragically, two people lost their lives in traffic collisions during November, and 76 serious casualties were recorded. These sobering statistics remind us why road safety remains a top priority.

### Targeting Dangerous Driving

Police and partners worked tirelessly to tackle high-risk behaviours:

- 133 drivers were caught using mobile phones behind the wheel.
- 69 arrests were made for drink driving and 190 arrests for drug driving.
- 193 seatbelt offences were detected, showing the continued need for basic safety compliance.

### Insurance and Careless Driving

Uninsured vehicles pose a significant risk, and 535 vehicles were seized for having no insurance. In addition, 413 careless driving offences were prosecuted, reinforcing the message that reckless behaviour will not be tolerated.

### Road Policing and Community Action

Road policing teams made 212 arrests in total, while community involvement played a vital role:

- 731 Community Speed Watch warning letters were issued.
- 410 Extra Eyes submissions were received, where members of the public reported dangerous driving.

### Education at the Heart of Safety

Prevention is as important as enforcement. In November, 11,890 road safety educational courses were delivered, helping drivers understand the risks and responsibilities that come with being on the road.



These figures show the combined effort of enforcement, education, and community engagement in making Essex roads safer. Every statistic represents lives protected and tragedies prevented.

Together, we can continue to reduce harm and make our roads safer for everyone.

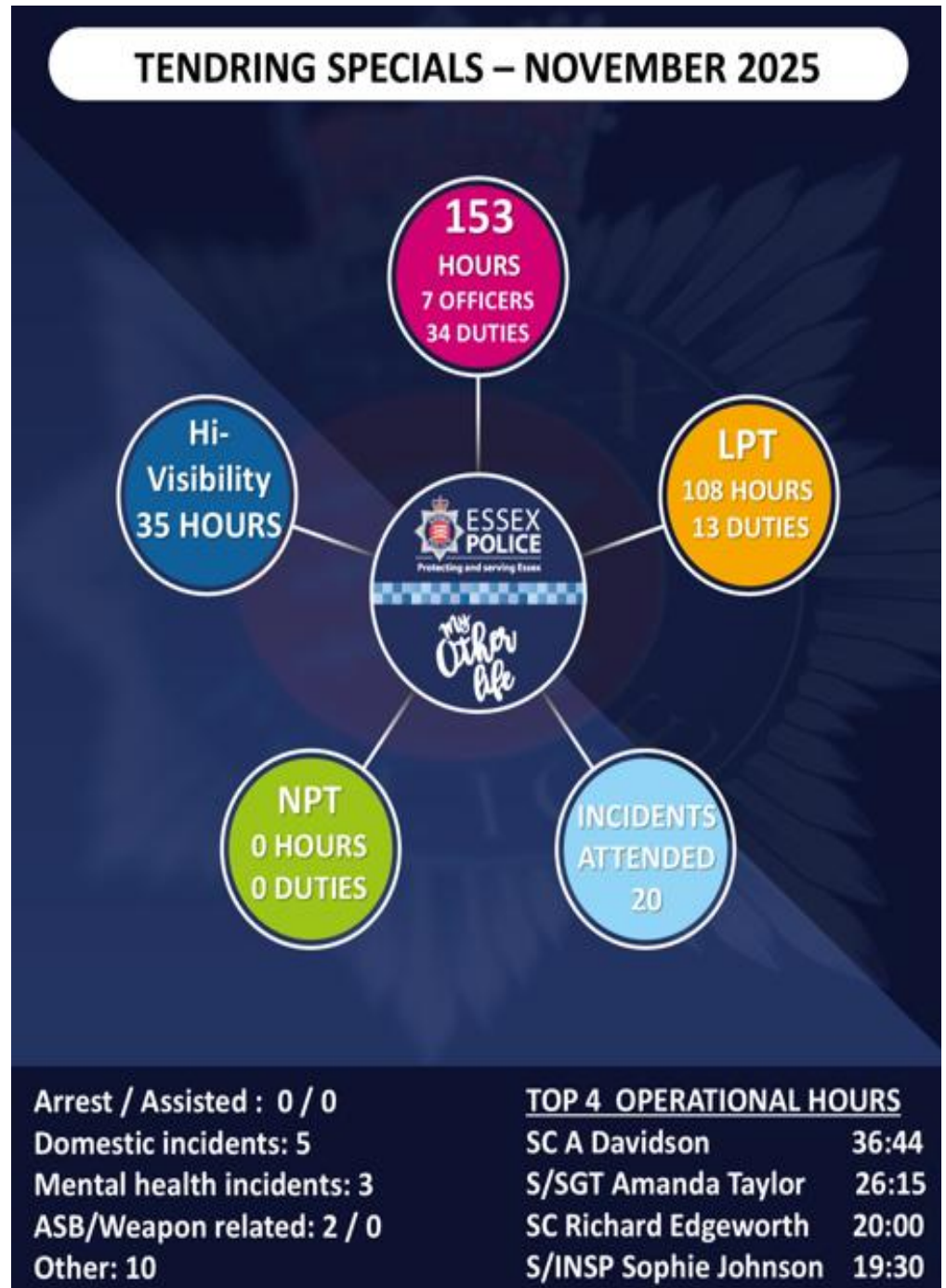
## Tendring Special Constabulary

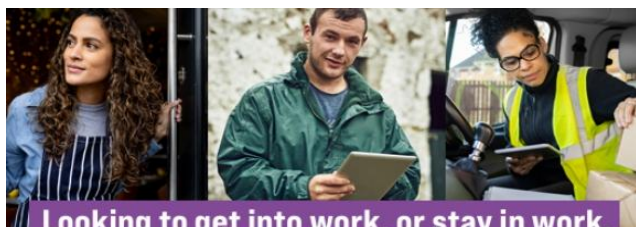

## Zero Tolerance for Drink Driving

This December, Essex Police is joining a national campaign to tackle drink and drug driving. There will be **zero tolerance** for anyone caught driving under the influence.

Our Roads Policing Unit will carry out targeted patrols across Essex to keep roads safe and identify those suspected of breaking the law by driving above the legal limit. Throughout the month, we'll work with the Safer Essex Roads Partnership to reduce the number of people killed or seriously injured on our roads.

Adam Pipe, Head of Roads Policing, said:

*"Driving under the influence has been a key factor in some of the most serious collisions on Essex's roads this year. My officers continue to see a worryingly high number of people who think it is acceptable to get*

*behind the wheel with alcohol or drugs in their system. Both can stay in your system much longer than you think, so you may not even realise you're over the limit.*

*My message is clear – if you drink or drug drive, you can expect to be stopped and arrested. If you're arrested you could lose your licence, your job, your home, and even your family. More than that, you could lose your life or be responsible for taking someone else's.*

*It is simply not worth it. Please, this Christmas THINK! about yourself, your loved ones, and other people on the road."*

Driving after drinking or taking drugs is dangerous and illegal. It slows reactions, affects judgment, and puts lives at risk – yours and everyone else's.

### The consequences:

- You could cause a crash and seriously injure or kill someone.
- You risk being arrested, losing your licence, and facing court.
- You could ruin lives – including your own.

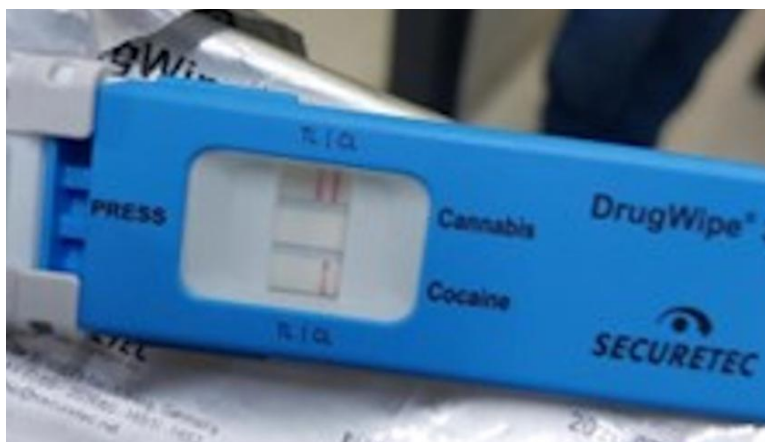
### Plan ahead this Christmas:

- If you're going out, decide how you'll get home before you start drinking.
- Use a taxi, public transport, or a designated driver.
- Don't let friends drive after drinking – make sure everyone gets home safely.

Throughout December, our message is simple:

- We will use every power we have to stop drink and drug drivers.
- If you suspect someone is driving under the influence, tell us. Your information helps us target hotspots and take offenders off the road.

Drink and drug driving is selfish, reckless, and completely avoidable. Let's work together to keep Essex safe this Christmas.





## Crime Prevention

### Keep your home safe, don't advertise to burglars

Burglars often look for easy clues that suggest a home contains valuable items. One of the most common giveaways? Leaving packaging from expensive purchases outside your property or next to your bins.

When you leave boxes from high-end electronics, gadgets, or luxury goods on display, you're essentially telling potential thieves what's inside your home. This makes your property a more attractive target.

What can you do?

Break down packaging and place it inside your recycling bin or take it to a local recycling center.

Avoid leaving boxes or branded packaging visible from the street.

If possible, dispose of packaging after collection day to reduce exposure.

A few extra minutes to conceal packaging can help protect your home and belongings.

## Man arrested following incident in Elmstead Market

A 45-year-old man has been arrested on suspicion of assault and possession of an offensive weapon after reports of a man behaving erratically in School Road, Elmstead Market, on 8 December.

Chief Inspector Stuart Austin reassured the community:

“We understand this incident has caused concern for those living and learning nearby. However, I want to reassure everyone that we do not believe there is any wider risk to the public.

The offences are in no way connected to the nearby school, and we have maintained close contact with them since the reports were made.

You will see a visible police presence in the village over the coming days. If you have any questions or concerns, please speak to our officers.

We’d also like to thank members of the public who contacted us and provided information that supported our investigation. Our enquiries are continuing.”

## Help Us – Help You!

Every day we answer thousands of phone calls from members of the public asking for our help. And we are dedicated to helping people, especially in an emergency.

But we are continuing to see an increase in people ringing 999 for something that isn't an emergency. Just 20% of the calls we are receiving to 999 actually need an emergency response.

So, we are asking people to think about whether they need to call 999. Or if another way of getting in contact with us would be better. By doing this, it will help make sure we are free to answer those phone calls from people who need our help the most. Calling 999 must be a last resort.

You should only use this service if you are reporting an emergency. What is an emergency?

Listed below are a few examples of emergencies when it would be necessary to call 999. This is not however an exhaustive list and common sense must prevail.

### General circumstances of an incident reported to the police, when there is or likely to be:

**Danger to life use**, or immediate threat of use, of violence serious injury to a person and/or serious damage to property.

**Criminal conduct** The crime is, or likely to be serious and in progress. An offender has just been disturbed at the scene. An offender has been detained and poses, or is likely to pose a risk to other people.
